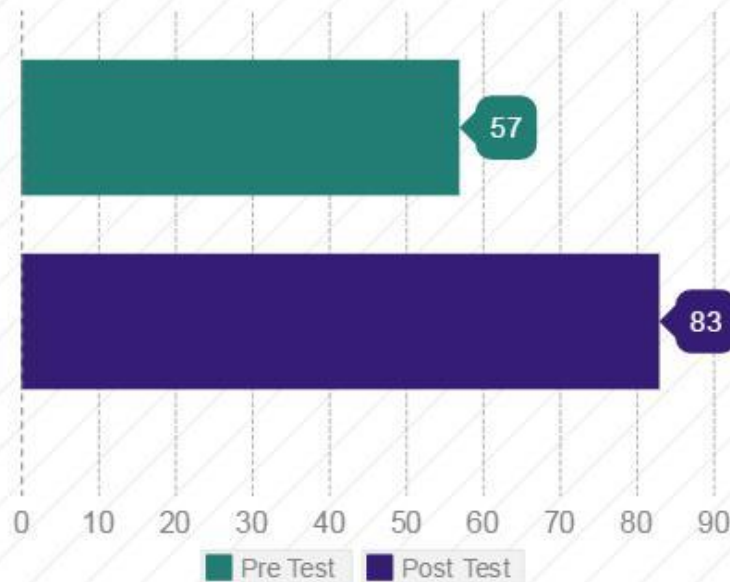


Students Show Overall Increase



Middle and High school participants were administered a pre and post test to evaluate their knowledge. Students showed an overall 26% increase in knowledge in the areas of consent, healthy relationships, coercion, gender socialization, and how to help a friend.

Individual Analysis

Individual analysis of pre and post testing also illustrated a statistically significant changes in knowledge on the post test, with the exception of two questions. Students base level knowledge of helping a friend and the types of abuse in relationships were fairly high on the pre test, showing little change on the post test



If my friend is in an abusive relationship they should decide how to get help and who knows about it (True!)

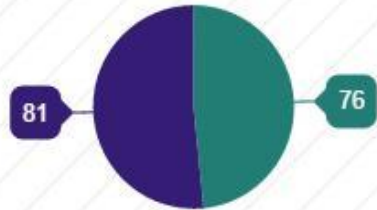
5% Increase



All abusive relationships involve physical aggression, such as hitting or slapping (False!)

6% increase

There were some notable differences in students' baseline knowledge of certain topics when comparing boys' responses to girls' response.



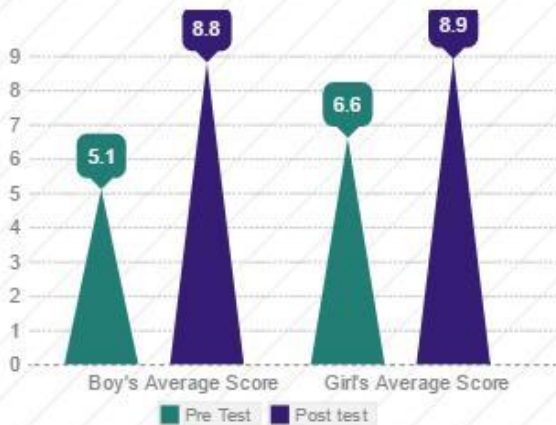
■ Male (48.41%) ■ Female (51.59%)

The finding from the evaluations confirmed the importance of education students about gender socialization, and helping them debunk those messages.

Turning Point's curriculum is designed so that youth can see the root causes of domestic and sexual violence and the stereotypes that perpetuate and encourage violence

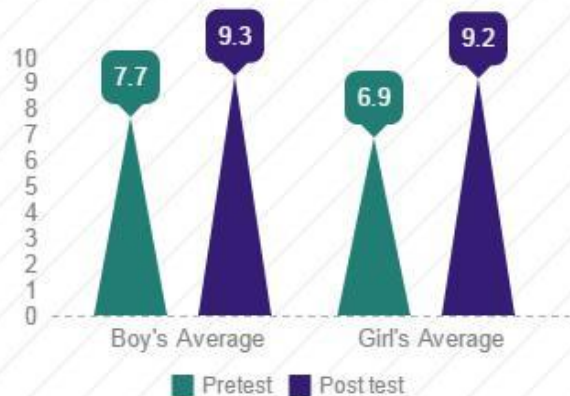
Sexual Assault

Item #1: Pressuring your partner to do something sexual by saying, "If you really loved me you would" is sexual assault. (True!)



On this item, girls scored significantly higher than boys on the pre-test, but both genders scored very high. Overall, students learned that coercing someone into doing something sexual is sexual assault

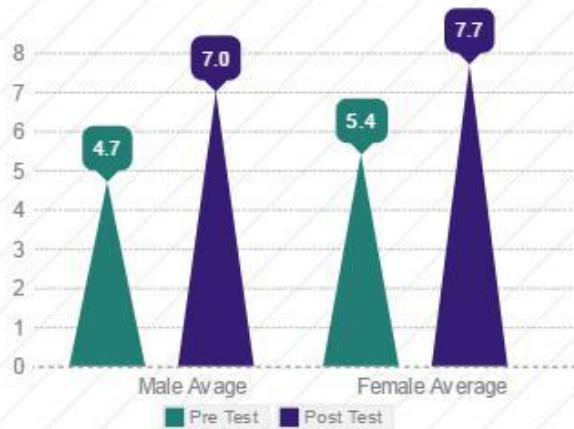
Item #2: Sexual assault can happen through oral penetration. (True!)



Before the educational workshop, boys has a slightly higher knowledge of the different ways sexual assault can occur. After the workshop, both boys and girls showed an increase in knowledge of sexual assault.

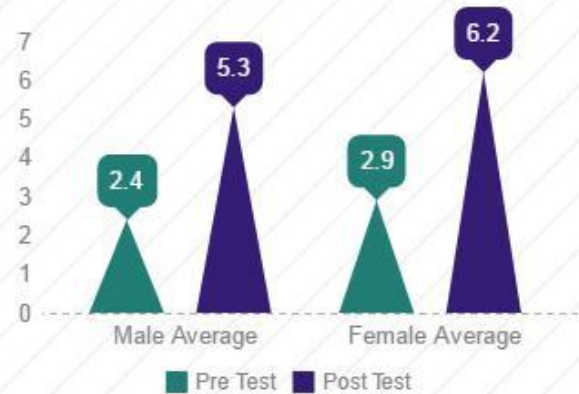
Domestic Violence

Item 3: Intimacy means not pressuring your partner for sex and respecting their right to say no. (True!)



Prior to the workshop, girls were slightly more knowledgeable than boys on the meaning of intimacy. Overall both boys and girls increased their knowledge of how intimacy plays a role in healthy relationships

Item 4: People who abuse their boyfriends/girlfriend typically have anger management problems that they cant control. (False!)



A common excuse as to why a person batters is often blamed on anger management issues. Before the workshop students scored low on this question, but shows a highly significant increase on the post test. Students are now aware that anger management is an excuse to batter.

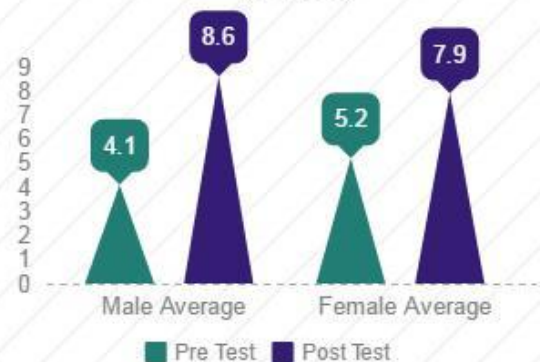
Sexual Harassment

Item #5 Sexual harassment is any unwanted touching to a person's private area. (False!)



Prior to the workshop, boys' baseline knowledge of sexual harassment was significantly higher than girls' knowledge. Overall, students learned the difference between sexual harassment and sexual assault.

Item 6: Sexual Harassment does not include looks and facial expressions. (False!)

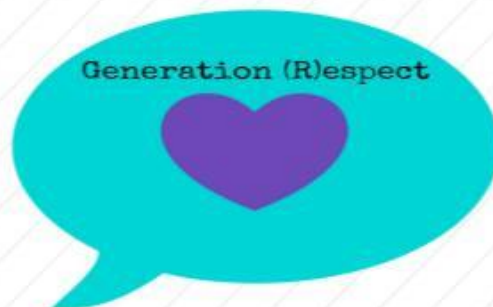


On this item, boys' baseline knowledge of different way harassment can happen were lightly lower than girls' knowledge. After the the workshop, boys' scored higher than girls' on the post test

Turning Point's Junior Council



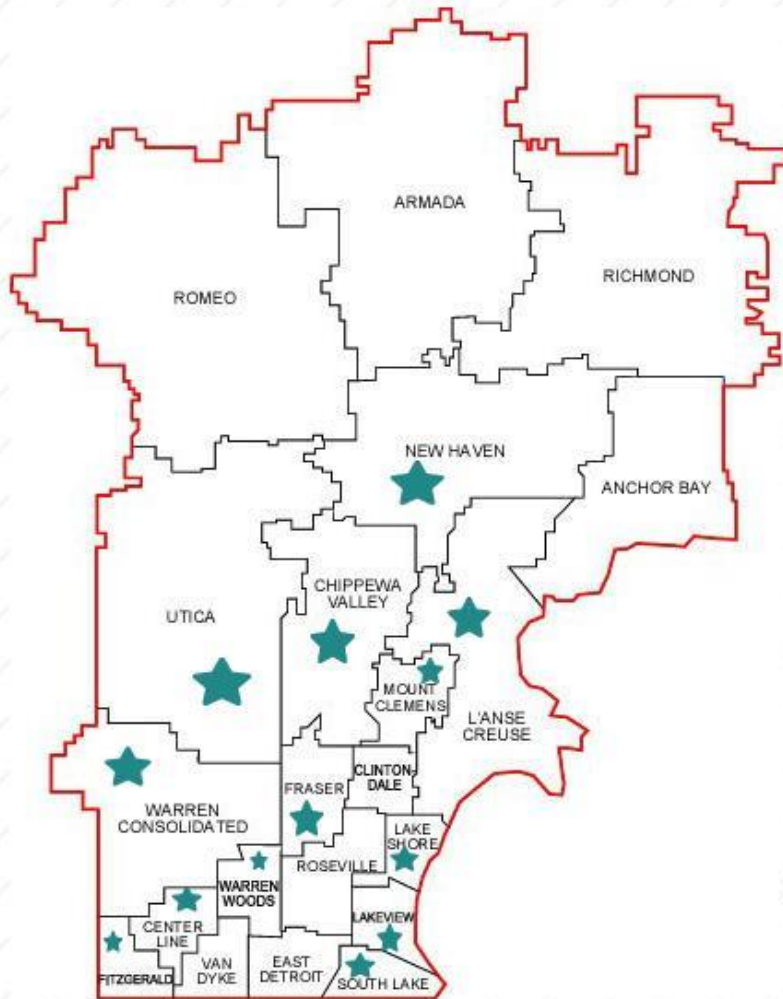
