DENIM DAY

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month, and Denim Day is a call to action for all people to come together by wearing denim as a visible sign of protest against sexual violence. Every year we ask community members, elected officials, businesses, and students to make a social statement; on April 25th wear jeans as a visible means of protest against misconceptions that surround sexual assault.

Why denim? Denim Day was originally triggered from a ruling by the Italian Supreme Court in which a teenager was assaulted by her driver's training instructor. The rape conviction was overturned because the justices felt that, since the teen was wearing tight jeans, she must have helped her rapist remove her jeans, thereby implying




consent. The following day, the women in the Italian Parliament came to work wearing jeans in solidarity with the survivor. Denim Day started internationally in response to this case; wearing jeans annually on Denim Day has become a symbol of protest against erroneous and destructive attitudes about sexual assault.
