Dear Friends and Supporters,

We have had another productive and meaningful year at Turning Point.

This year's strategic direction centered on expanding our housing, wrap-around care, and services. One of the consistent barrier's survivors face is access to safe and affordable housing for themselves and their families. We have worked to increase rental assistance, transitional housing units, eviction protection, and wrap-around case management services to survivors of domestic violence, sexual violence, and human trafficking. With the support of one of our funders, the McGregor Fund, we have been able to provide Direct Assistance funds allowing us to provide critical support to help survivors overcome barriers to sustainable housing, transportation for themselves and their families, personal protection orders, and medical treatment and prescriptions.

We are also seeking to fortify our Human Trafficking Program further by expanding our transitional supportive housing and rapid rehousing services. We have made great strides to help fund, develop, and implement the program and are currently positioned as one of the central Human Trafficking service providers in Macomb County and Southeast Michigan. Over the course of the year, our Forensic Nurse Examiner Program has seen an increase in the number of non-fatal strangulation exams provided to survivors of intimate partner violence. Turning Point will continue to look for additional funding for these exams once the current funds from Impact 100 are exhausted.

We have also focused on funding diversification and have worked to increase grant funding from non MDHHS-DVS sources. Turning Point will continue to seek additional federal grants and increase our efforts to receive individual giving over the course of the next several years.

Impact 100 Macomb Grant Funds Non-Fatal Strangulation Exams

Members of Impact 100 Macomb awarded Turning Point a grant for \$111,000 for our Forensic Nurse Examiner program to provide non-fatal strangulation exams to survivors of intimate partner violence. Research shows that abuse that includes strangulation has a 750% increased likelihood that homicide can occur. The grant helped fill a critical gap in services as there is no state or federal funding available to cover the cost of these exams.

Second Hand Rose Moves to New Location

Second Hand Rose held a ribbon cutting for the opening of their new location at 16 Mile and Gratiot in Clinton Township. The new location is three times the size of the old location allowing for the resale shop to offer furniture, household items and clothing. The store is a resource for survivors and all proceeds from sales to the public benefit Turning Point's programs and services.

Housing Program Success Rate & Expansion

Turning Point expanded its Housing Program by 20 units making it possible for more survivors and their children to move to violence free homes. In addition to housing, survivors receive supportive services including life skills, career planning, and financial literacy. The program is proud to have a 93% success rate for those participating in the program.



SURVIVOR SERVICES

24-Hour Hotline - 586-463-6990

Available 24/7/365 to provide support, safety optioning, and resources to survivors of domestic violence, sexual violence, or human trafficking. Hotline staff are also available to support loved ones of survivors, community members, and professionals. Language translation services and teletypewriter (TTY) available.

10,657 Hotline calls were answered

Emergency Shelter

A secure, handicapable building with 52 beds provides emergency, temporary shelter for survivors and their children who are fleeing from domestic violence, sexual violence, or human trafficking. Based on availability, a community partner offers safe boarding to family pets for residents.

383 survivors sheltered including 202 Children

Housing

Rapid Re-Housing and Transitional Housing Programs provide safe, affordable housing and supportive services to survivors.

65 families with 95 children housed

Human Trafficking

Provides emergency shelter, transitional housing, first response advocacy, and additional services to all survivors of human trafficking - labor or sex - regardless of gender, sexual orientation, or sobriety.

Program began in mid 2023 - no statistics available for FY2023

Forensic Nurse & First Response Advocacy

Available 24/7/365 to provide comprehensive medical forensic examinations and emotional support to adults, adolescents, and children who have experienced sexual assault, intimate partner strangulation, and/or human trafficking in Macomb and St. Clair Counties.

478 individuals were provided medial care, services, and or consultation

Personal Protection Orders

Staff assists survivors with Personal Protection Order (PPO) forms, motions, and e-filing, while also providing support, resources, and safety optioning.

1,758 survivors received PPO services

Legal Advocacy

Legal advocates are not attorneys but are well-versed in the legal system and victim's rights. They can provide survivors with advocacy throughout the legal process as well as accompany survivors to court.

116 survivors received legal advocacy support

Advocacy/Counseling

Provides individual and group sessions for adults and children impacted by domestic violence, sexual violence, or human trafficking to promote healing and increase access to resources.

383 survivors sheltered including 202 Children

Community Education

Our presentations focus on raising awareness and understanding, ways to support survivors, create healthy relationships, and end violence in our communities. Services are available to organizations, professional audiences, faith-based communities, and other community groups.

9,180 individuals attended 379 presentations

Prevention Education

Prevention Education works to educate middle and high school students on consent, healthy relationships, dating violence, and human trafficking through one and two-day classroom presentations. The program also offers education for school staff and parents.

7,251 students attended 244 presentations

Second Hand Rose

Offers support to survivors and affordable merchandise to the community. Visit our website for store hours and donation schedule.
